


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Introduction

The Evaluation Criteria aims to promote a cohesive approach to corporate reporting that will improve the quality of information available to the stakeholders. It will help in elevating the level of accountability and stewardship of reporting organizations and enable effective decision making.

The Evaluation Criteria further aims to promote integrated thinking within the organization considering both financial and non-financial information. In this regard, the inspiration has been derived from the 'Content Elements' (disclosures) of the International Integrated Reporting Framework (IR Framework). The participating companies are encouraged to fully adopt the IR Framework by applying the 'Fundamental Concepts' and 'Guiding Principles' into their corporate reporting.

Explanatory Note

Companies are recommended to assess the risks related to the potential theft or compromise of their technology, data or intellectual property in connection with their operations, as well as how the recognition of these risks may impact their business, including their financial condition and results of operations, and any effects on their reputation, stock price and long-term value.
